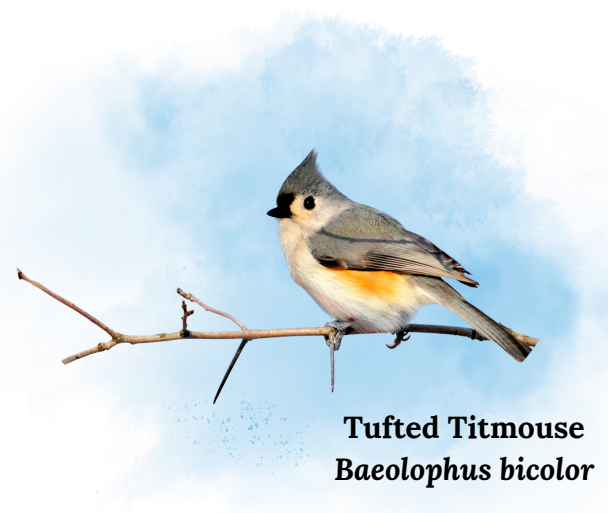

A Guide to this Brochure:

This brochure provides an introduction to birding as well as a checklist for birds common to this area, categorized by season. *Note: The categories are when you are **most likely** to see these birds. There can be overlap for multiple birds that are present during multiple seasons.*

Birding Broken Down:

Birdwatching (birding) is the activity of observing and identifying birds in their habitat by looking at physical characteristics or hearing their songs/calls. Here are some tips and tricks:

- Have a pair of binoculars or a scope.
- Use apps like  **Bird ID** to identify calls and features.
- Listening is just as important as seeing when it comes to birding. Study the songs and calls of common birds to help with ID just by hearing alone.
- Be patient and respect the nature around you.

Four Ways to ID:

1. Size and shape

Look at silhouettes, beaks, tails, and even feet shape.

- Eg., the Sharp-shinned and Cooper's Hawks are extremely similar; however, the Sharp-shinned Hawk's head barely protrudes from the wings while the Cooper's Hawk's head is much more elongated (see below).



2. Color pattern

Try and observe overall patterns rather than matching every feather color.

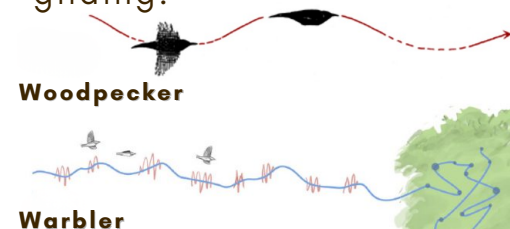
- Eg., Both Turkey Vultures and Black Vultures are dark, large birds that soar. Turkey Vultures have two-toned wings of white and black. Black Vultures have mostly black wings with white wing tips.



3. Behavior

Look at feeding, movement, posture, and other patterns.

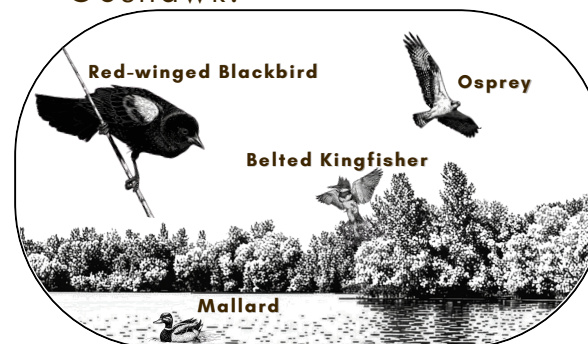
- Eg., sparrows and warblers fly in a straight path with quick wing flaps; woodpeckers "undulate" with hard flapping followed by gliding.



4. Habitat

Location and time of year.

- Eg., are you by a big lake or a big forest? Depending on your answer will determine your odds of seeing an Osprey or an American Goshawk.



**To be 100% confident in your bird ID, field marks can be used to confirm a species (e.g. Mallards have a blue and white speculum and American Black Ducks have a purple and black speculum).*
